SYNOPSIS

Hidden in a van, 9-year-old Roman crosses borders from Ukraine to Germany to be reunited with his mother Oksana. But he finds her not alone. She lives with a 62-year-old widower, working illegally as his caretaker. When Roman finds his mother in bed with the old man, he desperately struggles for her attention. Then, Oksana falls seriously ill, and mother and son are separated once more. Roman finds himself trapped in a remote place, cut off from civilization, and totally dependent on his rival.

DIRECTOR'S BIOGRAPHY



Marcus Lenz 29. Sept 1969 in Hattingen

Marcus Lenz grew up in the Ruhr area and studied directing and cinematography at the German Film and Television Academy Berlin (dffb) under lecturers such as Bela Tarr, Wolfgang Becker, Slavomir Idziak, Michael Ballhaus and Mike Leigh. Since graduating he has been directing documentaries and feature films. His experiences in these different fields lead to a particular working style that combines the advantages of both. He was always fascinated in documentary work to experience the surprising, cliché-free stories that real life writes, while working in feature film offers the ability to dramatize these stories and consolidate them in an atmospheric way. Marcus film ideas are often born after encounters with real people out of which the screenplays' imaginary characters grow.

DIRECTOR'S NOTE

The templates for my characters Roman, Schwarz and Oksana are real people whom I have personally encountered. During the shooting of a documentary, I spent a lot of time with a real "Roman", from his first minute in Germany, his first conversation with "Schwarz" up to the day when he first attended a German primary school.

From the very beginning, I was fascinated by the powerful but hard-to-define dependencies between the characters in this love triangle. Questions rose in my mind: what prevents us from getting into contact with each other? And what does it do to us, when the fear to be isolated becomes reality?

We experience the world of RIVAL through the boy's eyes. Using a style that combines documentary-like observation and aesthetic accentuation, I wanted my audience to experience young Roman's perspective. How does a child perceive the world? What does he look at, and how does he see what's there? This way, we share a perspective that can forget the world surrounding it and enhance the real world with fantasies.

Shooting with a child requires a particular openness and flexibility, allowing room for spontaneous impulses in which the child actor's intuitions can blossom. Yelizar Nazarenko, our wonderful child-actor, never got to see the script. Nor did he know how the story would develop or end. I described particular situations to him and asked him to show me how he would feel and what he would do.

He enriched the film with his wild curiosity and his overflowing energy. There are no educated acting skills in the boy yet, and what he shows is so raw, honest and unfiltered, that I couldn't stop watching.

RIVAL tries to frame the intense interior view of a childlike soul that has lost its place in the world, but which grows tremendous strength. Roman will never lose faith that he will be able to live together with his mother, come what may.





Gunter Hanfgarn & Andrea Ufer (producers):

Up from the start we were intrigued by Marcus´ story, set against the backdrop of two problems we see in a lot of western countries — the nursing crisis and poverty emigration. RIVALE tells the story of interdependence and illegality in none of the known ways. His escape hurls Roman, a nine-year-old Ukrainian boy, on a catapult into the foreign world of the German province. We see the world through his eyes, understand his rebellion and learn to like the enemy who is with him. The film offers surprising twists and turns, although the hope for an easy resolution is in vain. Marcus Lenz avoids clichés and delivers no black and white picture, but many shades of gray for existential terms such as love and jealousy, attachment and freedom, fear and care. A story like life, a story that resonates for a long time. The project wasn´t easy to finance, but thanks to a devoted and creative bi-national team we managed to produce this extraordinary film.
